**Organ and Brass Spectacular
featuring Sean Vogt and the Cathedral Brass**

(Saint Paul, Minn) THURSDAY, MAY 14, 7:30pm, Dr. Sean Vogt, choirmaster at the Cathedral of Saint Paul, and artistic director & conductor of The Apollo Club, will perform as part of the Cathedral's Centennial - 2015 celebration. The concert features a wide variety of works from themes of peace, to the apocalypse, and other audience pleasers – including an audience sing-a-long with the organ and brass! Of special note, the program will include a rare performance of Stephen Montague's "*Behold a Pale Horse*" and featuring the recently-expanded Aeolian-Skinner, one of two historic organs at the Cathedral of Saint Paul (read more on the restored organs <http://www.cathedralheritagefoundation.org/node/95>).

As an organist, Dr. Vogt has performed at several national and international venues, national music conventions, and also serves Minnesota as the state *Repertoire and Standards Chair: Music and Worship* for the American Choral Directors Association. Vogt is currently coaching with Dr. Stephen Hamilton, Music Director *emeritus* at the Church of the Holy Trinity (Episcopal) in New York City.

The concert is free and open to the public. Free will donations benefit the Organ Endowment Maintenance Fund.
